The Miracle of Shelburn


As the air war over German occupied Europe built up in late 1943 and early 1944, Allied aircrews who had been shot down and evaded capture began to build up and become a serious problem to patriotic nationals of the occupied countries who were sheltering them. To relieve this pressure and to return these crews to England, British Military Intelligence slipped a number of agents into the occupied countries to help organize various underground groups into escape networks.


It was in late 1943 that two Canadian Army volunteers, Captain Lucien Dumais and Lt. Ray LaBrosse were flown into occupied France in a RAF Lysander to set up an organization to help Allied airmen escape from occupied Europe. They named this organization "Shelburn" after a county in Canada.

With the help of patriotic Frenchmen from all over France they organized and executed "Operation Bonaparte", one of the most daring and successful escape operations of World War II. Downed Allied fliers were gathered from all over France and systematically sent to the towns of Guingamp and Plouha in the Province of Cotes du Nord in the Brittany section of France. From here they were transported by small truck and on foot to the beach for their rendezvous with the British Motor Gun Boat 503.

Reseau Shelburn's "Operation Bonaparte" was responsible for the safe return of 135 Allied agents and fliers, 94 of whom were U.S. Air Force personnel.

After the war General Eisenhower presented the Freedom Medal to these brave people for their courageous work.

Airmen and agents were picked up from the beach by small rowboats from the M.G.B. 503. Powered by three high speed diesel engines, the 120 foot long craft normally cruised at 33 knots but could go faster. She was under the command of Lt. Cdr. Mike Marshall O.S.C. during "Bonaparte" missions. The 503 was lost with all hands immediately following V.E. Day after hitting a mine in the North Sea.

In 1954, two American airmen who had escaped from France via "Operation Bonaparte" went back to France to retrace their escape route. During this visit they met Mathurin Branchoux, one of the Shelburn leaders in the Guingamp area, who furnished them with a list of the 94 American airmen who had been returned to England by "Operation Bonaparte". This list was the nucleus of the Air Forces Escape and Evasion Society (AFEES). In June, 1964, the AFEES sponsored a reunion in Buffalo, New York, attended by Dumais, LaBrosse, Branchoux, Anita Hartman Lemonnier and 35 former airmen. AFEES was officially organized at this meeting and it was resolved to meet in Paris in 1969.

In June, 1969, fifteen members of the AFEES and their families in concert with members of the Royal Air Forces Escaping Society Canadian Branch, met in Paris and journeyed on to Brittany for a reunion with the members of Reseau Shelburn. As a result of this warm meeting of the two organizations, a strong bond of friendship was established.

IN JUNE OF 1974, A BRONZE PLAQUE WAS DEDICATED BY A DELEGATION OF AFEES MEMBERS AND REPRESENTATIVES OF THE U.S. EMBASSY. AT THIS DEDICATION CEREMONY, 50 MEMBERS OF SHELBURN WERE INVITED TO BE THE GUESTS OF THE AFEES DURING A TWO-WEEK VISIT TO THE U.S.A. THE FOLLOWING IS THE STORY OF THAT VISIT.



Between October 5 and 20, 1976, 50 members of the SHELBURN evasion network visited the U.S.A. The visit was sponsored by American airmen who had escaped to safety from Bonaparte beach in 1944.

Most members of the delegation are from Brittany. The party was led by Monsieur Yves LE PICARD, although he was not a member of Reseau Shelburn, he is the President of the Brittany Section of the French veterans of the resistance. He was accompanied by Monsieur Alain LE GUEN, who is a county councillor, and the mayor of PLOUHA. The members of the Air Force Escape Society, which is chaired by Mr. Ralph PATTON, had prepared an extraordinarily warm welcome for those who had helped them escape from occupied France. In the various cities where they called, the French visitors were generally the guests of American families.

FROM GUINGAMP TO NEW YORK CITY

On October 5, at 3 a.m., a coach from Guingamp, called at PLOUHA, ST. QUAY-PORTRIEUX, BINIC and SAINT BRIEUC, picking up local passengers who were later joined by a few others from Southern Brittany and the PARIS area. A Pakistan Airlines jumbo jet took off from Orly Airport at 5 p.m. The Transatlantic flight would take over 7 hours. During the crossing, a substantial meal was served, including a huge cake adorned with the Cross of Lorraine. The plane landed safely at Kennedy Airport, where the time was 7:30 p.m. (00 H 30 French time).

The party is very warmly welcomed by Ralph PATTON, and at 9 p.m. the small French group board a bus bound for NANUET, a small town located some 30 miles North of NEW YORK CITY. The party is accommodated at the "Sheraton

Motor Inn" at the crossroads of three highways. The Press and Television meet the French visitors, and the first reception follows chaired by a lady-senator from NEW YORK STATE.

ACROSS NEW YORK STATE

On October 6, after breakfast, the bus with Mr. Johnson, a very friendly black chauffeur at the wheel, is heading North along the Hudson River, across Spring Valley, which is beautifully green with numerous forests and small white painted detached homes on either side of the road. Small farms are scattered here and there, with red painted silos, white cows with black udders are grazing.

The bus stops at ALBANY, the capital of NEW YORK state, with a population of 120,000 and a University which was founded in 1795. At the junction of the Hudson River and Erie Canal, ALBANY and the twin-city of Troy form an important industrial Center (oil refineries and light mechanical industries). Lunch is served at an Italian inn, the "Chez d'Italia", where the French visitors are the guests of Colonel Agenor CASTRO, a public relations manager, NEW YORK state correctional services Department. Several photos will appear in the local press the following day.

The bank of the Hudson is left, and the bus drives along the Mohawk River, and on through AMSTERDAM, UTICA, SYRACUSE, across forests and small villages with their attractive small churches. ROCHESTER is by passed and BUFFALO reached in the evening. BUFFALO has a population of 500,000 and is located on Lake Erie. It has an important port, with busy industries: steel, engineering, automobile, electrical equipment, textile.

The night is spent at NIAGARA FALLS, a city of 86,000 between Lake Erie and Lake Ontario. Primarily a tourist site, NIAGARA FALLS has also specialized in electro metallurgy, electro chemistry and plastics.

The "John's Flaming Hearth" Hotel stands close by the Falls. It is a first class hotel, with television in every room. A formal dinner is given in honour of the French party by the escaped Canadian airmen. Three speeches are made at the end of the dinner: by Mr. Don McClarty, President of Canadian Airmen, by Mr. Ralph Patton and Mr. Le Picard. Shortly before midnight, the party will gaze in wonder at the Floodlit Falls, red on the American side, blue on the Canadian side. They divide the two countries and the sight is fairy-like.


On the morning of October 7, the French visitors are roused from sleep by the rumbling Falls, and after having shot a few pictures of the unique scenery, they stroll towards Niagara Falls Air Force military base (914 th T.A.C.), where a number of "Hercules" and training fighters "Gruman" can be seen. A lunch is given by Colonel Mariello, who is in command of the base and has been in the Air Force for 30 years. He had flown over France 36 times during World War II.

INTO CANADA

The bus crosses a bridge spanning the Niagara River over a gorge of great beauty, and drives into Canadian territory, Here is Sainte-Catherine, a city with a population of 120,000. Then the bus rides on "Queen Elizabeth Way" along the South side of Lake Ontario, and amidst vineyards and orchards of peach and apple trees. The brick cottages are quite attractive with their well kept lawns opening on to the road. Past Hamilton and Brantford, the bus runs on the TORONTO-DETROIT highway, and across Windsor, a city of 220,000. Canada is left through a tunnel running under the river of Detroit.

Bloomfield Township, Bloomfield Hills, Michigan

Driving into Detroit, the coach is escorted by two big police cars, and the motorcade stops in front of Bloomfield City Hall. BLOOMFIELD, with a population of 50,000, is a suburban center near Detroit (Population 4 million). A reception is given in the municipal Hall by the Supervisor, Home Case. He presents the Mayor of PLOUHA with two superb books tracing the genealogy of French immigrants in Detroit between 1701 and 1901. Monsieur LE GUEN thanks him in the following words:

"Wherever we go, the Americans who greet our party express their grateful thanks to us for our having sheltered 94 U.S. airmen in PLOUHA in 1944; and smuggled them to safety across the Channel. In our turn, we ought to be thankful to the great American nation of its intervention in the two World Wars. It was in Detroit that the weapons of victory were made, since the capital of the automobile industry alone produced one third of the United States armament, chiefly ammunition, trucks and armored tanks."

On the same evening, while all French members are the guests of American families, they are given an opportunity to watch on T.V. the warm celebration given at City Hall during the day.

The SHELBURN party will spend two days in Detroit, October 8 and 9. This big city was founded in 1701 by a Frenchman, De Lamothe Cadillac, and in 1896 Charles King ran the first American automobile. Detroit is an industrial center of paramount importance with steelworking, automobile works (Ford, Chrysler, General Motors), shipbuilding, chemistry, foodstuffs, etc.

The morning of October 8 is devoted to a visit of Henry Ford Museum, where the pioneering spirit, which sparked the making of America, has been preserved. The museum, which is unique of its kind, contains valuable exhibits, covering

American History, from the silver masterpieces created by Paul Revere to Henry Ford's first automobile, the 1896 four-wheeled cycle. In the hall of Mechanic Arts, visitors can trace the course of the Industrial Revolution from the days previous to steam to the jet plan era. A remarkable collection including 200 motor cars illustrates the progress achieved by land transportation in the fields of steam electricity and internal combustion. The museum shelters life-size steam locomotives, airplanes, boats, agricultural implements, horse carriages and bicycles of all times.

The tour is wound up by a lunch given in Greenfield Village Restaurant by the "Detroit Bank and Trust Co."

Following a guided tour of the city, a dinner for 150 guests is given by Detroit airmen at the "Birmingham Country Club". At the end of the dinner a high school choir sings several American songs and the French anthem. Speeches are delivered by Mr. PATTON, Job MENGUY (on behalf of the Shelburn resistance group), and Colonel Raymond Labrosse from Canada (who was one of the network leaders in 1944 in PLOUHA). The Mayor of PLOUHA receives an American flag from the hands of Ralph PATTON. This flag which used to float on Capital Hill in Washington, will be one of the exhibits in the Resistance Museum to be built on the site of Bonaparte Beach. Mr. LE PICARD winds up the speeches by expressing grateful thanks to the audience.

On October 9 is spent visiting Detroit and the neighborhood with American families. Some of the guests are taken to OAKLAND UNIVERSITY, one of the ten universities located in Michigan. OAKLAND University registers 10,000 students, of whom 2,000 live on the campus, while the staff includes 300 teachers, lecturers and Professors. Both buildings and sports grounds are drowned in a vast environment of woodland and green spaces.




