WORTH REWRITING

Stephen Galembush U.S. Navy Petty Officer was parachuted into the province of Montanegro in Yugoslavia as an OSS agent to aide the Partisans and to effect the recovery of American airmen shot down following the raids on Ploesti. As radio operator to the Rakeoff Mission, Stephen Galembush came to the aide of 300 American airmen during the period of April 9, 1944 to the end of July, 1944.

Galembush, now a retired engineer from I.B.M. in Endicott, N.Y. is trying to track down some of those 300 guys he helped. In May 1987 he traveled to Yugoslavia to renew old friendships and to revisit the area of his O.S.S. activities; he received a royal reception and is now planning on a return trip in 1989. He hopes that he can find some of the Americans who were there with him during the war and would

like to return there with him. He promises "an experience of a lifetime," for those able to join him. Ed. Note: During the reunion in Denver, I was honored to meet with Stephen and his wife. He's a fine gentleman and after reading his book, I'm sure that anybody going back to Yugoslavia with him would have a memorable trip. Ed.

STILL LOOKING

I write to you in the hope of finding a trace of an American who I had helped during the last war. This airman was named William C. Martin. He was, at this time 20 years of age. Unfortunately this is the only information that I am able to give you about him.

I myself was hidden in the region of Landereau, in

south Finestere.

The 17th of May 1943 around 12:00 noon, on returning from bombing Lorient the fortress was hit and in difficulty and was followed by German fighters.

During this aerial combat a number of airmen were machine-gunned in their descent from the airplane. I went to the aide of one of the wounded. I led him to the home of Mr. & Mrs Roignant at Kleuziou. (Landeleau)

Mr. & Mrs. Roignant have a certificate of recognition signed at the request of the President of the United States, by General Dwight D. Eisenhower. It came from MIS X Section, HQ W BS USFET, APO 513 U.S.Army

Dear Sir: My late uncle, Lieutenant Irwin "Zipper" Zaetz, served in China during WWII with the 14th Air Force as a B-24 Navigator. In late 1943, he and his crew were forced to bail out over Japenese-occupied territory and eventurally made their way back to their home base.

I am writing trying to inquire (1) About membership in your society for my uncle, who was killed in January, 1944, and (2) Make contact with any members of your organization who either knew "Zipper," or had similar experiences in China. I am prepared to furnish you with official documentary proof of my uncles evasion of capture, if necessary.
